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Nationwide Prescription Surveillance Advances

All 50 states have a prescription drug monitoring program. Most monitor various controlled substances, including Sudafed, but Nebraska tracks every prescribed medication.

Forty-three states exchange information using these systems. Electronic prescription drug monitoring programs began to pop up in every state after the U.S. Department of Justice offered funding in 2003. Now the Department of Defense is building a nationwide prescription drug monitoring program. Nine states have already signed on.

Your consent is not required, and the data is used for research, profiling and law enforcement. Ask your state legislators to stop these unconstitutional surveillance systems.
